
JUDGES, 2021



Dogs are being trained to sniff out COVID-19 in humans

Researchers are putting canine scent receptors to the test. Scientists are training dogs to identify COVID-19 by following their noses. A new program at the University of Pennsylvania's School of Veterinary Medicine (Penn Vet) is putting noses to the grindstone for disease detection. Researchers are working with dogs to see if the canines' superiorsniffers can helpo with early detection of COVID-19 in humans.



. Dogs that can pinpoint the scent of COVID-19 could identify infection in people who are asymptomatic, and could

play a valuable role in disease response as people return to work and social-distancing restrictions are relaxed, Penn Vet representatives said in a statement,



BASSET HOUND PERSPECTIVE FROM THE UK (Thank you Margaret Ledward)

UK's comments on the Head and Skull - Part I

- Domed with some stop
- Occipital bone prominent
- Medium width at brow tapering slightly to muzzle
- General appearance of foreface is LEAN not snipey






GOOD

- **POOR**
- There may be a small amount of wrinkle at brow and beside eyes. In any event skin of head supple enough as to wrinkle slightly when drawn forward or when head is lowered.

Top of muzzle nearly parallel with line from stop to occiput and not much longer than head from stop to occiput

- As a rule dogs with shorter heads tend to have shorter necks and longer headed dogs will have long necks.
- Heads are especially important since they distinguish one breed from another.
- In some breeds great importance is put on head features over correct movement.
- REMEMBER THE BASSET WAS BRED FOR ENDURANCE.
